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Council clippings

The following matters were among those dealt with at the ordinary meeting of council on 17 September.

An application by the Baptist Union of Western Australia, to build a 'Place of Public Worship' on residential-zoned land on South Coast highway was unanimously approved, with conditions. It was the second time council considered the application, after a refusal in May went to mediation at the State Administrative Tribunal (SAT).

The size of the proposed building is unchanged, but two of the uses originally proposed, of 'consulting rooms' and 'community use' have been withdrawn.

An officer recommendation to conduct a review into parking and transport in the town centre was approved. The review will consider how traffic, parking, land-use and development in the main business district have changed in the 20 years since council's Commercial Strategy was adopted, and 25 years since Town Planning Scheme 3 has been in force.

Council resolved to advertise a draft Local Planning Policy 47- Parking & Sustainable Transportation for six weeks' public comment.

A proposal to modify building side setbacks on Inlet drive and Minsterly road was deferred subject to an investigation into

whether council could override the relevant State Planning Policy (SPP). Local resident Ross Thornton, who is a member of the WA Statutory Planning Commission, told council during public question time he believed that councils were unable to change SPPs.

Council confirmed its in-principle support for applying to the federal and State governments for funding for a new surf lifesaving clubhouse. The club has secured \$1.5m from Lotterywest and the shire has committed \$900,000 to the \$5m project. A funding application to the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries last December was unsuccessful.

Road infrastructure is also a big-ticket item with \$837,518 set aside for preservation, footpath and drainage along Ocean Beach Road.

Bridge works account for \$670,301, bitumen seal and resurfacing \$472,812, and \$152,937 will complete a roundabout and parking in Barnett and Strickland streets, plus \$15,000 for lighting installations.

When is a rate rise not a rate rise?

THE front page of the *Denmark Bulletin* of August 13, 2015, above, reported that a five percent rate rise was considered by the council of the day to be "diligent and efficient".

Fast forward to the present, and then deputy shire president John Sampson, who supported that rate rise, last week

publicly accused, through the same newspaper, the current council of setting the present rates "with neither proper nor full consideration", calling it "economically irresponsible" and claiming that "council has failed in its core duty to provide fairness and equity to the community". Last week's *Bulletin*

also openly blames current shire president Ceinwen Gearon's leadership as responsible for there still being no public swimming pool, council's rejection of the (fundamentally-flawed) East River Road bridge proposal, and for failing to deliver "an accountable council".

RED CROSS UPDATE

A branch of Red Cross started in Mount Barker in 1918 during WW1. This disbanded and re-opened in May 1940 and has continued ever since. In 1973 a group of dedicated members and their husbands set up the first store in Mount Barker in Lowood Road, where it was offered rent free, with Red Cross paying the electricity and water. In 1974 more space was needed so they moved to 4 Lowood Road (Warries). It remained there until in 1986 Red Cross headquarters purchased the building in Mount Barker Road, its present location, where over the years many volunteers have served Red Cross with distinction to bring it to its present state, of which we are very proud. This brings me to the reason for this article. Mount Barker has many generous businesses that support many groups in the town. Mount Barker Red Cross Shop and Unit would like to thank Mount Barker Co-op and Mitre 10 for the grant, which enabled us to purchase two sheds for the shop. We had wonderful help to erect them, with James Howe putting up the small one and Jared and the team from Pardelup the large one. They will make things in our back room less cluttered. Many thanks to all involved. Thanks also must go to the Plantagenet Shire for their grant to assist us with rubbish removal costs and to their staff who helped us to present our application. We now have a company that assists us with the rubbish problem. Eco Aust are collecting the unwanted clothes, linen, shoes and bags, which are sorted and sent to Africa meaning less going into landfill. Importantly, we say thanks to our loyal customers who bring in donations and also purchase some of the good quality items we put out in the store. As we all know, an organisation can not carry out their tasks without good honest and enthusiastic volunteers and I must say we have a great team. Thank you Mount Barker.
